Moving on, the PGM had a bit of fun with a couple of items on the agenda. Coming to item 11, to agree a recommendation and proposal from the Provincial Grand Treasurer that the Provincial Grand Secretary should receive a £400 grant, he said in an incredulous manner "is anyone prepared to second that" which was met with much laughter. Similarly when reaching item 15, to elect the Provincial Grand Treasurer and after announcing that there was only one nomination, that of W. Bro Vivian John Lewis Bevan, he said rather tongue in cheek, "brethren, you are not giving me much choice here!" again to much laughter. Needless to say both of these propositions were unanimously approved by the brethren.



The next item was to reappoint as Deputy Provincial Grand Master, Very Worshipful Brother Christopher Williams and in so doing the PGM thanked him for his continued support and help during the year, particularly when he was in the country!

The agenda then moved on to what was the highlight of the day for many of the brethren assembled, the Appointments and Promotions for 2016-17. This was the time when past achievements were recognised and future commitments and intentions were expected of the recipients.

The new Provincial Grand Wardens were Worshipful Brother Peter Lorymer Wills as Senior Warden and Worshipful Brother Alan Richard Reed as Junior Warden and these brethren replaced

the outgoing Wardens, Worshipful Brothers Richard Lewis and Joe Davies. The PGM then paid tribute to the out-



going Wardens for their dedication to duty and commented on how well they had represented him at all the lodges, within the Province.

This year also saw the replacement of our Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies, W. Bro Phil Patrick. The PGM thanked W. Bro Phil for all the hard work he had put in over many years, both in terms of the expert way he conducted the ceremonies and in the way he facilitated and organised the transfer of equipment to the three different venues that Provincial Grand Lodge had been held over the past few years.

In his address to the meeting the PGM congratulated those who were to receive new appointments and promotions and said that this was reward not only for past efforts given, but also in expectation of further efforts to come. He also thanked the outgoing Almoner W. Bro Andrew King for his hard work and also the outgoing Librarian and Archivist to the Province, W. Bro John

The PGM then went on to describe some of the initiatives of Grand Lodge, He said that they had set up a Membership Focus Group to analyse the trends regarding recruitment and retention, remarking that it was in the first three years of membership that we lose the greatest number of our new members. As such provinces were encouraged to appoint a Membership Officer, to oversee the recruitment and retention of members. Therefore, within our Province he required that each lodge should appoint their own membership officer to aid their own recruitment and retention. These officers would work in close partnership with the Provincial Grand Mentor W. Bro John Allen. He also required each lodge establish a five year plan to set out their future direction and to monitor how they were doing against the plan. He emphasised, it was incumbent on every one of us to ensure the future of our lodges.



was about 09:15, and a crowd of visiting dignitaries dressed in the light coloured jackets and black trousers queued at the door to get in. The sun was shining on the newly cleaned portico. After I entered the hall, I saw our Provincial Grand Master, R.W. Bro. Alan John Vaughan, who had obviously got up early, busy meeting and welcoming our guests and ushering them into No 3 dining room, where they were greeted with tea, coffee and bacon or sausage rolls. Lovely.

After a chat and catching up with old friends we made our way up Park Street, to St George's Hall. For the frail and weary, quite a steep climb, especially after climbing the final steps to the reception area.

St George's Hall was our chosen venue this year as our usual venue, the

Bro Phil Harrill, who between them changed the venue into a Masonic Hall, by transporting the equipment necessary from Park Street to St George's, suffice to say when set up you would be fooled to think this was not its normal function.

Once the brethren were seated and ready for the day's proceedings the Director of Ceremonies, Phil Patrick, announced his instructions. He then retired and prepared for the first of three processions. The first was that of our distinguished guests, they were followed by the Bristol Grand Officers and then the current Provincial Officers who preceded the Deputy Provincial Grand Master and finally the Provincial Grand Master.



The usual agenda was followed and after conducting the roll of officers, apologies and roll of lodges, the minutes were confirmed and the PGM stood and welcomed each of our many guests in turn. It is fair to say that he had an individual and sometimes an amusing word for those he

Moving on, he explained that the Province was doing its bit in promoting Masonry in the wider community of Bristol and described the new floodlights which had just been installed on the portico of Freemasons' Hall. This would show everyone in Bristol where we are and what that large anonymous looking building was and as such increase our profile. We had also established a presence at various shows and exhibitions in the city, such as the Redland Green and Harbourside Festivals where we had a substantial presence. He then went on to congratulate W. Bro Viv Bevan and the help he had received from W. Bro Paul Robinson in running Park Street Events, our hiring and letting company, who continued to build our profile and make a contribution to increasing our revenue.

The PGM then said that in 2017, English Freemasonry would be celebrating its tercentenary and that he wanted every lodge to organise something to celebrate this significant event in our proud history. Going on to say that the Province would be doing its bit and that they had already held talks with Bristol City Council in order to establish an exhibition at M Shed of Masonic artefacts etc. M Shed is a new kind of museum working with the people of Bristol creating displays, which make everyone want to come and see. It is a living museum, where the stories of the past spark discussions about the future. A very fitting venue to promote Masonry.

To celebrate the tercentenary the United Grand Lodge of England have engaged a publicity company to produce

four one hour television shows, which would expound the virtues of being a Freemason. The UGLE would have final editorial rights over the series, which would be shown on mainstream TV.

The PGM then gave an update of the total so far raised towards the Province's target for the 2019 Festival for the Royal Masonic Samaritan Fund and said that with three years still to go, the total stood at just under £500,000 and paid particular tribute to W. Bro Steve Bennett, the fund's chairman and his team for their continued efforts.

In winding up his address, the PGM paid tribute to the secretarial team and the Provincial Grand Organist, W. Bro Paul Corder for their efforts and finally last but not least to the staff of St George's Hall for their assistance in ensuring today's event went off so well.

He then wished everyone a safe journey onward and hoped to see many of us back at St George's, next year.

After dispersal from St George's, we reassembled at Park Street, where a drinks reception was held for our guests before moving into two dining rooms where we were treated to one of our chef Fredy's delicious salmon salad meals.

At the conclusion of the day's events and the majority of us made our way home, our PGM settled down for a quiet drink in the bar to prepare himself for an evening visit to the Robert Thorne Lodge.

A long, tiring but very rewarding day I am sure.

t was a special evening for The Anchor Lodge No 6502 in the Province of Bristol on Wednesday 1st June when the President of the Masonic Samaritan Fund R W Bro Brigadier Willie Shackell attended their Installation meeting; he personally presented Festival Jewels to four of the Lodge brethren who have recently met or pledged to meet their individual 2019 Festival targets. The Jewels were specially engraved to mark the occasion. He then presented the Lodge with a Second commemorative Charity Pillar Plaque to show that they had already achieved double their 2019 Festival target, commenting that this would be a marvellous effort at the end of a Festival but to do so by the half way point is an amazing achievement. The per capita target was £495 and the 32 brethren had reached £1,067 per member!

He then addressed the Lodge and gave a report to the brethren on the work carried out by the Masonic Samaritan Fund across the country and said how pleased he was with the progress of the MSF 2019 Festival in Bristol. He was then presented with a 2019 Festival Firing glass by the Worshipful Master Stephen Huband as a memento of his visit.

R W Bro Shackell later dined with the brethren at their after meeting where he was thanked by The Provincial Grand Master for Bristol R W Bro Alan John Vaughan for his visit to the Province of Bristol.

In response, he thanked all the lodges in the Province for the fund raising efforts on behalf of the MSF, and was confident that the Province of Bristol would have a successful festival finale in April 2019.

RWBro Shackell, who has been appointed as interim Grand Secretary by the Grand Master and the Board of General Purposes, will be invested as Grand Secretary during the Quarterly Communications of Grand Lodge on 8th June.

Aortic Aneurysm Screening - Follow Up

ollowing my article in the last edition of The Bristol Standard about making Brethren aware of the Aortic Aneurysm Screening programme, I have received some feedback which is very encouraging and I'm really glad that this is being taken very seriously, as Aneurysm's don't go away!

Just a couple of weeks ago in early June, I had a letter from the widow of one of our Brethren from Colston's Lodge, to say that she herself had an Aneurysm a few years ago following a routine hospital visit and following surgery she has managed to continue with a healthy and active life.

I still cannot stress enough the importance of Brethren having a routine scan, as there is usually no warning when it bursts and certainly there isn't a second chance!

My latest scan, in June revealed that it has indeed grown and whilst writing this article am waiting for some additional tests (CT Scan etc.) to ascertain the extent of the aneurysm. I will be having an operation at the end of July, on my birthday of all days. The usual process from an operation takes a couple of months to acceptable fitness, but can take up to six months, so I'm told for a full recovery.

As you will understand, I am obviously very passionate about the problem and I again urge any Brother who is over 65 years old and who hasn't had a scan, to contact the number below and make a simple appointment for a check that only takes about 20 minutes. It can also be hereditary, so if you have a history in your family, it would be sound advice to get yourself checked out. As I mentioned before, this condition is mainly a male problem, but it can affect a small proportion of females.

If, however, you are a male 65 years old and over and have never been called for a scan, you should contact the number below.

Can I reiterate what I detailed in the last Standard that all males who live in the Bristol, Bath and Weston health areas can request a scan and this will be sorted by the Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm team. Your GP will automatically be notified about an individual's condition. It is very possible that there are Brethren in our Province who already have an Aneurysm and don't know it.

There are advisory leaflets about this in the bar at Park Street which gives a lot of information. Otherwise contact The Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm, AAA on 0117 414 8610. Arrangements are usually made so that you can attend your own or a nearby health surgery.

Bristol Province donated a generous £500 towards the event, which was 25% of the overall cost of staging the event, so our sincere thanks for supporting this fantastic community event. The event was held on the ground floor of the Galleries and increased the footfall of shoppers to over 1500 people on the day. It took place on the 'most depressing day of the year'.

The event included lively music, acupuncture and massage, delicious smoothies powered by bicycle, and opportunities to learn about and take part in exercise, including a visit from the Lord Mayor of Bristol.

Over 100 members of the public completed our feedback forms on the day, with many respondents commenting positively on the benefits of the event, particularly with having so many charities and support agencies from Bristol in one place for easy access and hopefully information by shoppers and people most in need.

Almost 25% of the people who responded to our feedback forms and gave us their postcodes live in the 10% most deprived areas of the city, most likely on very low incomes, and benefitted directly from the advice, information and positive mental health and well-being provided by the Blue Monday event.

ne of the greatest accolades that can be bestowed on a Bristol Royal Arch Mason must surely be being appointed to an office in Provincial Grand Chapter.

A day trip to Gibraltar

bout twenty years ago, the late W. Bro. Richard Laurence and myself, with our wives, went to Spain and took a day trip to Gibraltar. While there, we found the Masonic Institute building and said we should arrange a visit to one of the lodges, In those days you had to fly from Heathrow which was a bit of a drag to say the least. This year EasyJet started direct flights from Bristol to Gibraltar, flight time two hours fifteen minutes and I decided now was the time to fulfil that dream.

My first task was to check with our Provincial Secretary that the Lodges in Gibraltar are 'regular' i.e. recognised by our own United Grand Lodge of England; he assured me there would be no problem. The next step was to see if there was any enthusiasm from the Brethren in our St Nicks for a fraternal visit to Gib. I was pleasantly surprised, in no time I had signed up 13 brethren (plus wives and partners); 26 in total representing four lodges Saint Nicholas, Colston, Dolphin and Lodge of Agriculture (Somerset).

I investigated masonry in Gibraltar and found there are 15 Craft Lodges, 5 Royal Arch Chapters, 5 Mark Lodges and 5 other orders. When you consider that the population of Gibraltar is only 30,000, a lot of lodges to say the least. Some orders are part of the Gibraltar District under our own United Grand Lodge of England and some are under the Grand Lodges of Scotland and Ireland.

My next task was to find a lodge meeting that co-

incided with an EasyJet flight, The Royal Lodge of Friendship was the obvious choice.

The Royal Lodge of Friendship has a long history, dating back over 225 years, and they have had a number of prominent members, including Prince Arthur, Duke of Connaught, as well as, four recipients of the Victoria Cross. I contacted the Royal Lodge of Friendship Secretary and we agreed that members of St Nicholas would make a fraternal visit in May 2016 to see a 2nd Degree ceremony.

We were shown around the Masonic Institute building which proved very interesting with displays of lodge memorabilia and information on the Victoria Cross holders; a lot of history, much of it military.

We then joined our ladies at the Lord Nelson for dinner (an excellent four course meal) and an enjoyable evening of convivial company.

We had a very interesting and enjoyable trip and I am now thinking of the next one! Malta looks interesting?



The cost of building was £1,500 and the opening ceremony on September 15th 1936 was by the Right Worshipful the Right Honourable Lord Kensington, The Provincial Grand Master.

On our entrance into the glorious building we were met and welcomed with coffee and biscuits as it was only 11.30am and the Lodge would be tyled at 2.00pm.

The two pillars that once stood in the Temple are now placed in the entrance doorway and stand as sentinel to the beautifully decorated Temple although the globes which used to atop them have long since been removed. On the matting to greet the visitor were the words 'Croeso' and declares welcome in the native language in the Principality of Wales.

At 2.00pm the Installed Master's Lodge of Wales was opened, minutes and any other details attended to and called off to allow for us to set it for a ceremony that was to delight the filled to capacity Lodge. All seats were taken as their members watched and listened to every movement and syllable that was to form a demonstration to be proud of.

The candidate for the ceremony was borrowed from the Installed Masters Lodge and per-

formed admirably with just a little help and instruction from our DC. The heat of the day and lack of air movement could be blamed for a few of their members that allowed their eyes to close and with head back and mouth open, no doubt were taking in all of the relevance to the words used in this amazing ceremony. The Sword bearers were precision in its simplistic execution, assisted by Gareth Evans our entered apprentice of one week! Jason Spencer-Smith and John Bassett the Senior and Junior Wardens performed admirably, The Senior Deacon Adam Watts ably demonstrated the working tools. The Secrets imparted beautifully by Nigel Hicks and all parts of this most enjoyable ritual were carried out flawlessly to the delight of the assembled throng. To mass applause our Worshipful Master and his Wardens paraded out and retired to the bar for a small celebratory libation leaving our own Tony Griffiths in the Lodge room to assist the closing of the Installed Masters Lodge with the glorious music we take so much for granted.

The after meeting or festive board was a delight with its uncomplicated menu and plentiful supply of wine, after several toasts and the Full Monty of Welsh spoken and sung with great gusto we said goodbye to our hosts,
